- Additional Information:**
- Year 3 and 4: Students are strongly encouraged to study abroad for at least one semester in third or fourth year, earning up to 12 SPAN credit hours/semester. A semester abroad would significantly modify the program map and accelerate progress towards degree completion.

CRUSH YOUR COURSEWORK

- Present your research at ILC's Undergraduate Research Symposium or UWG Scholars' Day.
- Consider adding the Certificate in Global Languages and Cultures.
- Complete FORL 4586 and your Senior Capstone.

FIND YOUR PLACE

- Consider an internship that allows you to apply your knowledge of global languages and cultures.
- Apply for international programs that allow you to teach English abroad and refine your language and teaching skills.

BROADEN YOUR PERSPECTIVES

- Assess your cultural competency.
